The Society has a wealth of records, photographs and knowledge about the history of the village going back at least to its first recorded origins in the early 13th century. Although it is now a modern West Sussex village with a population of just under 2000 and some fairly new housing developments, its history can still be visibly traced through, for example, the 13th century St Peter's Church, its oldest house, Capons, built in the early 14th century, and some of its roads. such as the A281 which follows the ancient drovers' track from Henfield and the South Downs through to Horsham.

But those records were scattered among various people and places in the village and there was no central repository or access to the village's history. So the CVHS decided in 2016 to develop its own website and this was formally launched in April 2017. The website address is:

The site features a wide range of interesting features and facts including: the extensive 1911 census record of the village and its people; the 10 objects that denote the village history such as the Nelond Brass, the Millennium Map, and the 17th century Church Marks, a unique set of posts engraved with the name of farm or house whose owner paid a tithe to support the upkeep of the church; and the Society's current programme of events, its projects and its plans for the future. For those who like a bit of fun and a challenge, there is a Quiz about the village history and those who achieve a success rate of 80% or more can claim a signed Certificate of Achievement!

Over the last three years the Society has been developing a strong working relationship with St Peter's School. The School has participated in a History Day run by the Society and the Society has shared material on the school's history. The children have also been involved in sowing poppy seeds at locations

around the village in memory of the fallen during World War 1. The latest development of this relationship is the website's Junior History page. This showcases selected work by Year 6 pupils as part of their history syllabus; the work demonstrates impressive skill in the use of language and imagination, sentence construction and drawing. It is hoped that the website material will also serve as a learning resource for the pupils and give them the opportunity to discover and appreciate the rich historical legacy of the village and area in which they live. Closely linked to this will be the annual award of the Robert Farren Shield, to be presented to the School by the Society on 11 October, which together with a £20 book token, will be given to the pupil who has shown the most 'enthusiasm for history and advanced enquiry skills'.

Since its launch in April, the website has had nearly 1,500 visits including at least one from abroad. Feedback has been very positive and this provides an excellent platform for further development.
